Regardless of political party, gender, class, or race, Americans of the early republic (1780-1820) were strong believers in freedom. Alexander Hamilton and James Madison and others wrote a constitution that aimed to, "secure the blessings of liberty." In a letter to her husband, Abigail Adams pleaded with John to, "remember the ladies. We, too, of a right ought to be free." Daniel Shays justified his rebellion on the grounds that it was necessary for farmers "to be free from the bankers" tyranny." The slave poet Phyllis Wheatley appealed to King George III that, "a monarch's smile can set his subjects free."

Most of the original thirteen colonies were founded for religious reasons. Both the key founding groups of Massachusetts, the Pilgrims and Puritans, came to America for religious freedom. Indeed, Puritan leader, John Winthrop declared that the Puritans intended to be model Christian community in the New World; what he called "a city upon a hill." While the Pilgrims & Puritans had some different beliefs, they both established very rigid communities that tolerated very little deviation from established beliefs. This caused some Massachusetts colonists to get into trouble with the religious & community leaders. Among these was Roger Williams who fled Massachusetts and established Rhode Island as a colony founded on the idea of religious tolerance as a form of religious freedom. A similar emphasis on religious tolerance could be found in Pennsylvania. There William Penn used his colonial charter to establish a "holy experiment", founding Pennsylvania according to Quaker beliefs that valued respecting all people's beliefs. Clearly, religion played a large role in the founding of the British American colonies.
