## What is the Constitution?

- Fundamental Law of the United States
- Establishes the functions \& structures of our Federal (national) government
- Current Constitution is the 2nd constitution of the United


## States

- 1st: Articles of Confederation (1781-1789)
- 2nd: The Constitution (1789-Present)

- 3 Main Parts
- Preamble
- Articles
- Amendments


## The Preamble

- Introduction
- 1 (long) sentence
- Begins, "We the People"
- Lists 6 broad purposes
a. Form a more perfect union
b. Establish justice
c. Ensure domestic tranquility
d. Provide for the common defense
e. Promote the general welfare
f. Secure the blessings of liberty


## Articles

- Main Text: Outlines the structure \& powers
- Articles subdivided in sections containing clauses
- 7 Articles
a. Legislative Branch
b. Executive Branch
c. Judicial Branch
d. States' Rights
e. Amending Process
f. National Supremacy
g. Ratification Process


## Amendments

- Changes made since original text
- Process articulated in article 5
- 27 Amendments
- Bill of Rights = Amendments 1-10



## What does the Constitution Say about Electing a President?

- Article 2, Section 1:
- Term: 4 years (election every 4 years)
- Electoral College system
- Qualifications for Presidency
- Natural Born Citizen
- At least 35 years old
- At least 14 years residency
- Amendments: 12, 15, 19, 23, 26


## The Electoral College

- System NOT a place
- President is elected by "electors"

Path to the White House...


- Each state gets \# of electors = \# of senators + \# of reps
- Each state legislature determines how electors are chosen
- Electors from each state meet and vote for President
a. Simple Majority needed to elect President
b. If no candidate receives a majority, House of Representatives elects President



## Amendments

\#12: Separate Ballots for President \& Vice President
\#15: Right to Vote for men of color
\#19: Right to Vote for women
\#23: 3 electoral votes for the District of Columbia
\#26: Right to Vote lowered to 18 years of age
