## Debs' Speech to the Jury:

- 1. Why does Debs "admit the truth of all that has been testified to" including delivering the speech and the content of that speech? Isn't this essentially an admission of guilt?
- 2. What historical dissenters does Debs invoke? Why does he choose these dissenters to reference?
- 3. Why does Debs recount the history of opposition to previous American wars?
- 4. Why does Debs focus on the 1864 Democratic Party Convention?
- 5. In what sense are the Socialists "upholding and defending the Constitution" and why is this "strange"?
- 6. What is Debs' view of freedom of speech?
- 7. Who is Debs' audience? Is his speech effective? Do you think his audience is convinced?

## Schenck vs. United States:

- 8. Is the "clear and present danger" standard a good standard? What do each of the words in the standard mean?
- 9. Can merely attempting to do something, even if you fail, create a "clear and present danger?" Does it matter that Schenck didn't actually convince anyone to resist the draft?
- 10. What, if any, limits should there be to freedom of speech and the press? What, if any, speech should not be allowed? Why?
