## **ROAD to CIVIL WAR TIMELINE JIGSAW**

Introduction: The Civil War was arguably the most important event in American history. In fact, it is common practice to divide American history into two main periods: before the Civil War and after the Civil War. ## **Research Instructions:**

- Your group will have to find dates and information on each event.
- All the events are arranged in chronological order (I think).
- With your group members, divide up the events with each group member being responsible for about the same number of events.
- Individually, you must research your assigned events
  - o Find out when your event happened (be as precise as possible; some "events" are timespans)
  - O Find out what the event is (about 1 sentence)
  - o Find out what its <u>significance</u> is (about 1 sentence; how is it related to the road to Civil War)
  - O You are responsible for teaching your events to your group mates.
  - O Be sure you know and can explain all names, terms, acronyms etc.

## **Timeline Instructions:**

- After your group has gathered and shared all the required information, you need to make a timeline of the events.
- Each member must make his/her own timeline
- Whether you decided to make a vertical or horizontal timeline, plot all dates on one side (left or top) and all events on the other side (right or bottom)
  - O Include only the event on the timeline; not a description of it
- Make sure your timeline is titled
