Narcissa Whitman's condescension and "holier than-thou" disposition toward the Cayuse caused them to despise and eventually kill her. Gold rushers regularly found conflict with American Indians as they tried to push the Native Americans out of the way. And the continuous stream of homesteaders claiming land and trying to deny American Indians access to that land inevitably led to violence and war.
